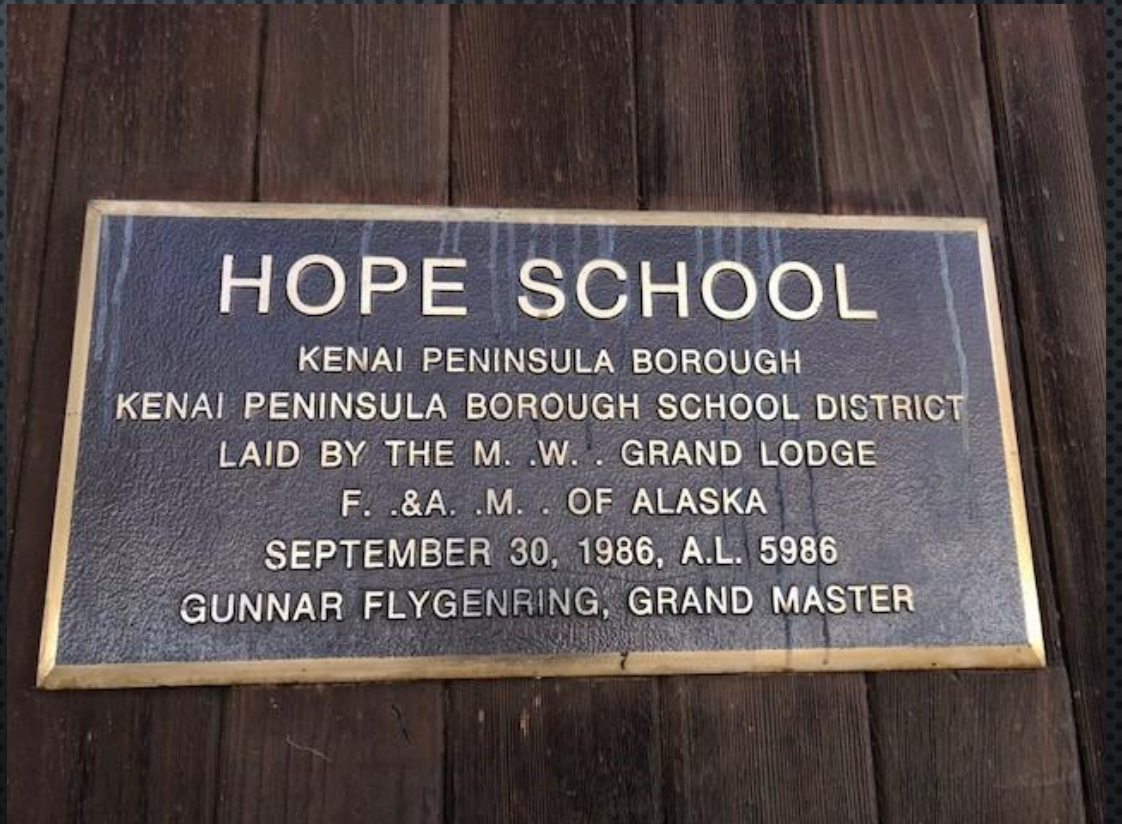

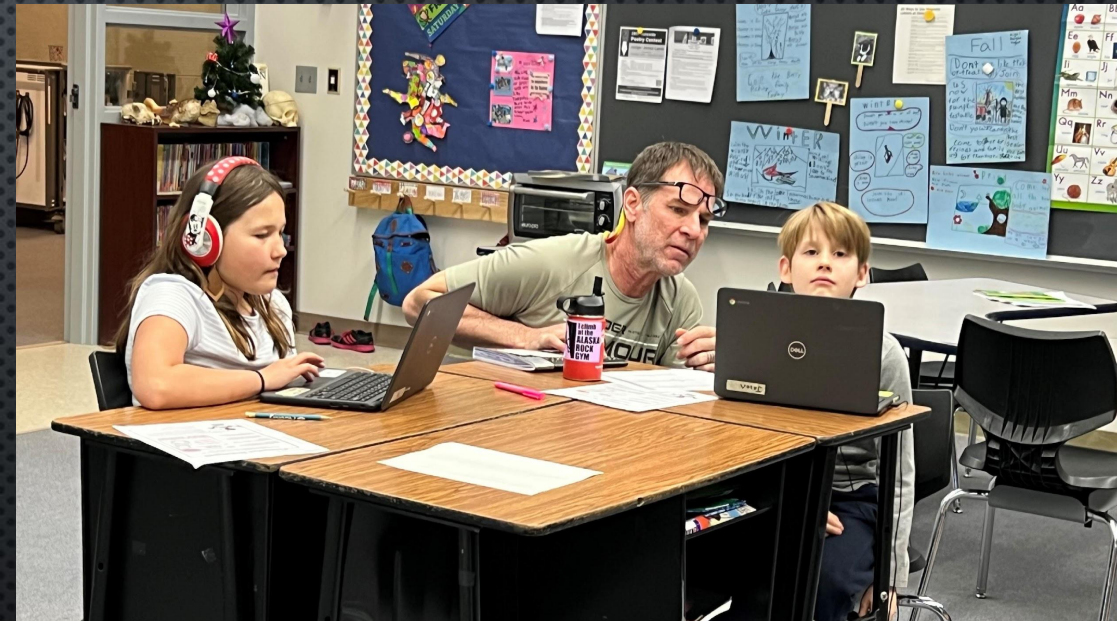
Hope School Helps students:

- ❑ **Be Curious** - Perspectives and situations can change the answers to questions. We are encouraged to ask lots of questions!



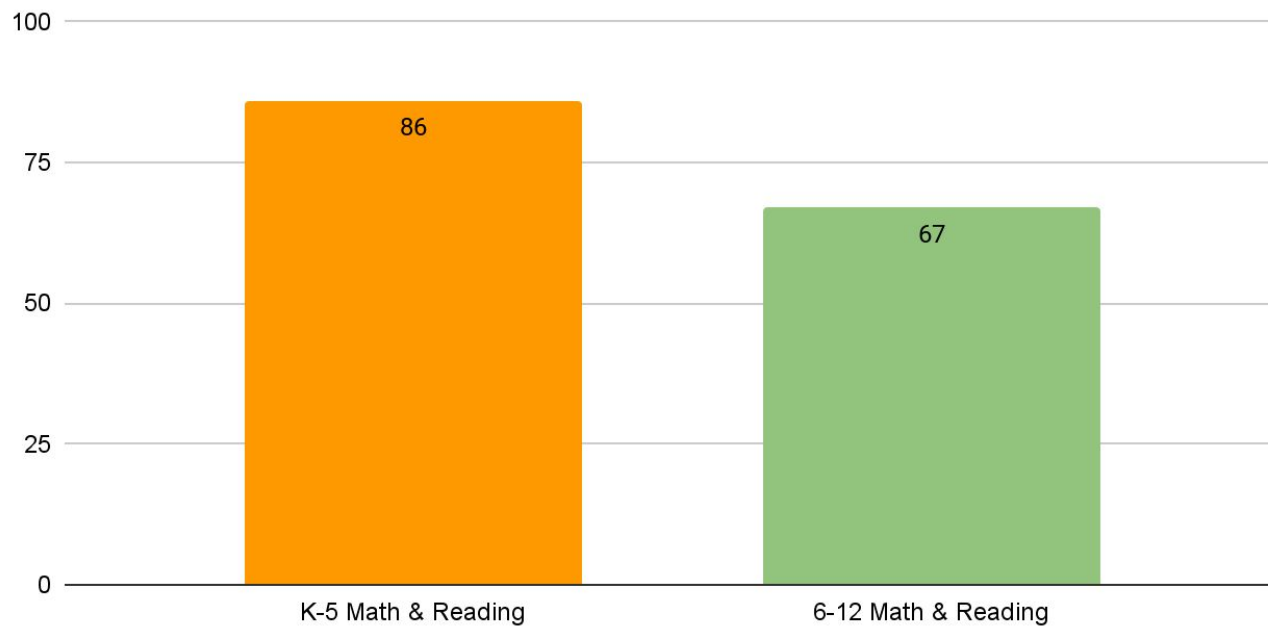
